## Managing the Association

The SACBR Committee meets four times a year, usually by zoom. At our March meeting we welcomed Sue Dancey, who has kindly volunteered to chair meetings this year as we don't have an elected Ringing Master. Julie Bowen has stepped into the role of General Secretary. We are fortunate to have many experienced teachers and leaders of practices among our members. This year, Tony Freemont and Gill Glover will organise training, ably assisted by Matt Lawrence, Nik Galton and Michael Carding.

At the March meeting, grants were awarded to Albrighton and Ryton towers, for work recently carried out to improve their bells.

The Association Rules were last reviewed over twenty years ago. We have made several alterations since, most recently to change the definition of our President, but we have now set up a small working group to consider all the Rules. ## News from the Towers

Following on from the success of St Chad, Shrewsbury's recruitment of new ringers, Oswestry ringers, led by Tower Captain, Brian Rothera, have started a recruitment drive of their own.

Two "taster mornings" were held in mid-January and early February which attracted 25 people. The tasters included an introduction to bells and bellringing, watching ringers in action, a go at chiming with the bells down, a tower tour including seeing the bells, and a trip to the roof of the tower, the highest accessible place in the town.

The taster days had been advertised through flyers, the Church web site, by word of mouth and social media. Since then, the ringers including Brian, Peter Woollam, Richard Major, Chris Hoare and Tony Freemont have laid on two hour long, one-to-one training sessions for those interested in taking ringing forward. These have been laid on at various times during the day and evenings on Mondays-Saturdays timed to fit in with the learners' requirements. Ten learners have taken up these training sessions, some have attended as many as 4 times, the youngest 9 and the oldest freely admitting she is 70 (in fact she had a training session on her birthday).

Eight of the ten are still coming to training sessions. All are progressing well and three can now ring in rounds independently and are joining in our Thursday evening practices. Two even bit the bullet and joined the AGM!

Our impression is that there is a lot of interest in traditional activities and a keenness to learn and join in with community events. Thanks to Jenny Hoare we also had a three page spread in the Shropshire Magazine, which we hope might inspire others to ring and not just in Oswestry.

All new (and newish) members of the Association were invited to get together at Edgmond to meet other new members and the Association committee. The meeting/practice was directed by Gill Glover, with a lot of help from our hosts, Paul Lewis, Mark Adams and Rob Davis. The towers represented at the practice included Bicton, Dawley, High Ercall, Market Drayton, Meole Brace, Shrewsbury, and Wellington.
Ringers came with a variety of ringing experiences, from having started to learn recently to being able to ring Plain Bob Doubles on an inside bell. Those who needed a bit of extra assistance were helped by experienced ringers. Several of the learners remarked how nice the bells are, and how well they were able to manage them. The ringing included rounds and call changes on six and eight bells, Plain Hunt, Plain Bob Doubles, and Grandsire Triples (for the helpers).
Members who had been elected at the 2024 AGM were able to collect their New Member packs. Tea, coffee and delightful baked goods were available throughout the morning. Jad Bienek kindly brought the Association's box of Books for Ringers, for perusal, and some books were available for purchase.
It was great to hear a lot of happy chatter and laughter, not to mention happy eating! Thanks go to all those who helped make this event so enjoyable.
